## A Night Out with the Ministry Teams

Approximately 25 St. Gilesers defied the spectre of Friday the 13th and the darkness of a November evening to meet at our church to reinvigorate our ministry teams with updated statements of purpose, new plans, and the expectation of new members. The six ministry teams, **Exploration and Discovery**, (actually divided into two groups: Adult and Youth), **Building and Grounds**, **Outreach**, **Communications and Newcomers**, **Liturgy and Music**, and **Fellowship** each met separately at various places at church. Their meetings were to last an hour and each team was assigned the task of developing a statement of purpose, identifying key issues for the night's meeting, and naming a facilitator and a tentative date for its next meeting.

Later all the teams met together and reported out the results of their evening's work. It was clear that a lot of energy and a renewed sense of commitment accompanied these reports. Space here prohibits a full reproduction of the accounts from each team, but hopefully what appears below will give the reader an introduction to the renewed work of our ministry teams.

Outreach Ministry Team's Statement of Purpose is "...to provide practical support and spiritual comfort to those in need, locally and abroad." Its key issues are to involve St. Giles in outreach needs such as, for example, the ecumenical Community in Action Team as well as a broad variety of traditional and new initiatives such as our Backpacks for Kids

effort and, possibly, the "Cookies for Troops" and WABK "Love Fund" programs. Interested in helping with this team's work? Contact Trudi Hodgkins or Raymond Anderson.

The Fellowship Team's issues for the coming year will be to organize parish events such as a Shrove Tuesday pancake supper, a summer picnic, and a return trip to a Sea Dogs' game, among other possibilities. Its statement of purpose is "...to focus on the social side of parish life, to foster participation in parish life, and to strengthen relationships and understanding within the parish family of St. Giles." The renamed Communications and Newcomer Hospitality Team adopted as its purpose, "...to welcome and educate newcomers to the community of St. Giles and to communicate effectively all vital information to every parishioner." It developed an ambitious agenda which includes, among other things, creating a welcome packet for newcomers, developing a *Pine Hill Care and Share* bulletin board where services can be exchanged or people can post their needs, and updating the KJ and the LCN with weekly bulletins with information on who is preaching and what may be happening after church. Dear Parish Family:

In my daily prayer time, I use a monthly, intercessory guide. This month the guide features several quotations from Mahatma Gandhi. They are beautiful. They touch my soul. As we are discovering in our Exploration and Discovery program for adults, there is a whole new world out there of spiritual insight in other religions that can inform and deepen our Christian faith. So it is with the great man from India.

All through November on Mondays, I have read these words, "It is good enough to talk of God whilst we are sitting here after a nice breakfast and looking forward to a nice luncheon, but how am I to talk of God to the millions who have to go without two meals a day? To them God can only appear as bread and butter." Thanksgiving is in a couple of days!

And then on Tuesdays there is this: "Like the bee gathering honey from the different flowers, the wise person accepts the essence of the different scriptures and sees only the good in all religions." Such wisdom in so few words!

We are now walking through the season of Advent, anticipating...and waiting...and wondering. What will happen? Will someone be coming? Will that One who is to come knock on our door? Will it be the door to our heart?

This is one of those years when the First Sunday of Advent falls on the Sunday right after Thanksgiving. It is as if we are just pushing our chairs back from the Thanksgiving table after the delicious piece of pumpkin pie with whipped cream and we are asked to "do a 360" into four weeks of deep inner work to avail ourselves of the divine mystery of Jesus' coming. This is not easy spiritual adjustment!

But we CAN do it! And that is where St. Giles' comes to our aid. We are a vital, visionary group of followers of Jesus who, Sunday after Sunday, open our hearts and, literally, stretch our muscles to be the disciples of Jesus out in the world. If you look and listen you can see this many times each Sunday in our church. It is the grace of God before us.

Good luck and good work to you as we continue our walk through Advent to the tiny stable of Bethlehem. And, thank you, Mr. Gandhi, for helping us along the way.

Liturgy and Music Ministry Team is "...to plan services for seasons efficiently and effectively." On its agenda is the Bishop's visit on January 30, promoting "affirmation" as the theme for Epiphany, and planning for Lent and Holy Week. Lee Burns and Jean Greenwood may be contacted if you are interested in the work of this team.

As noted, Exploration and Discovery can be looked at as two teams, one covering adult ed, the other, programs for kids. The group working on adult programs defined its purpose "...to learn about our own beliefs by exploring them in more depth and by comparing them to the beliefs of others." The team proposes, for example, that the comparative religion program continue in January with a series on Buddhism and that, in addition to the presentations themselves, an extra session be added to provide a chance for people to express their personal reactions as Christians to what they have been taught. The team also suggested that the adult ed programs on other religions be scheduled closer together to maintain their momentum and interest. If you want to know more about this team's plans, contact Cynthia White or Don Kraus. The youth side of Christian education is also full of plans, including the possibility of a repeat of Camp St.Giles. Please contact Meegan Burbank for more information.

The Building and Grounds Ministry Team adopted a purpose statement which commits them "...to be stewards of our building and grounds, maintaining a safe, attractive, 'green' facility." The team came up with a long list of projects to address its purpose, among which were to winterize the church building, perform an energy audit, revise the office area to make it into a study, and investigate and install better altar area lighting. So, at its November meeting, the vestry:

Also, I appreciate a follow up report from you. How is your loved one doing? Are they stable, improved or chronic? I need to know when to take them off the prayer list. I purge the list about every four to six weeks. Usually, healing of an acute episode has occurred during this time.

Our prayer list tends to be for acute conditions; like a sudden heart attack, a surgical procedure, a diagnosis of cancer, or an accident. We all have loved ones with chronic conditions and naturally we want to pray for them as well. If this becomes a priority, I will create two lists.

## St. Giles' Recycling Efforts

A hearty "Thank-you" to those who take the time to think about and perform recycling, especially when dealing with used coffee grounds! To help clarify for those who might be curious, the current list of items that are "recycle worthy" are:

- All card board - flattened
- Tin foil – rolled into ball, tin pie plates, etc.
- Glass, clear and colored (except tumblers, for some reason)
- Coffee grounds w/o filters (for composting)
- Newspaper and magazines (may go together)
- #2 plastic, clear and colored
- \*clear plastics #s 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7: (no colored, including white, allowed.)
- \*Rigid plastics: e.g., old plastic toys such as Playschool, buckets, landscape trays, laundry baskets (and those darned plastic packages that we can't open without a jackhammer!)
- All mixed paper (must be clean, no tissues, plastic, candy or food wrappers)

I will try to provide extra containers for items 1 through 4, if I can find a place to put them that's handy. For now, all of these items can be put in current kitchen containers, as labeled, with the exception of mixed paper (including Sunday programs) that goes into receptacle to left of table in narthex.

\*The really good news is that the Jefferson/Nobleboro Transfer Station is engaged in a trial with Waldoboro for Lincoln County Recycling (LCR) in Wiscasset. LCR placed an additional container at the Transfer Station to collect all clear and rigid plastics as defined in # 7 and 8. This will reduce by even larger amounts the debris dumped into the waste stream, and, of course, our Lincoln County will benefit. Profit for recyclables has gradually been improving as compared to a few months ago when breaking even was about all one could hope for. Just keeping them out of the waste stream, however, is a huge benefit for our planet. Mr. Perry Waltz, manager of the Transfer Station in Nobleboro, reminded us that yellow "Planet Aid" containers were placed there last year to collect clothing and shoes for third world countries. While this is a for-profit entity (not the Station's), it still keeps these items from being tossed into the waste stream.

## Outreach Ministry Team 2009

This Christmas season, St. Giles' will be sharing the bounty that is our good fortune to have by linking with the Positive Matters Foundation and its Family Holiday Wishes Program for Lincoln County. This program helps to provide gifts, warm clothing and food for those folk, especially children, who are struggling in our county. This program helped provide for over 1300 children and their families here in Lincoln County during the last three years.

Here at St. Giles, we will place a "Giving Tree" in Jewett hall w/ gift tags that will include the gender and age of a child for whom a gift of under \$30 may be purchased. As well, one can give "generic gifts", e.g., matchbox toys, Barbie dolls and board games. Individuals can also give money. Cynthia Simonds, Director of the program, states, "We are often running out at the last minute to shop for unfulfilled wish tags. We provide a family meal for around \$40 and warm clothing for many. Money and/or volunteered time are always welcomed."

Checks may be made out to "Programs Matter Foundation" and designated for a specific need (such as food, clothing) if the donor so wishes. Program Matters Foundation is a 501C tax-exempt non-profit and your gift is tax deductible.

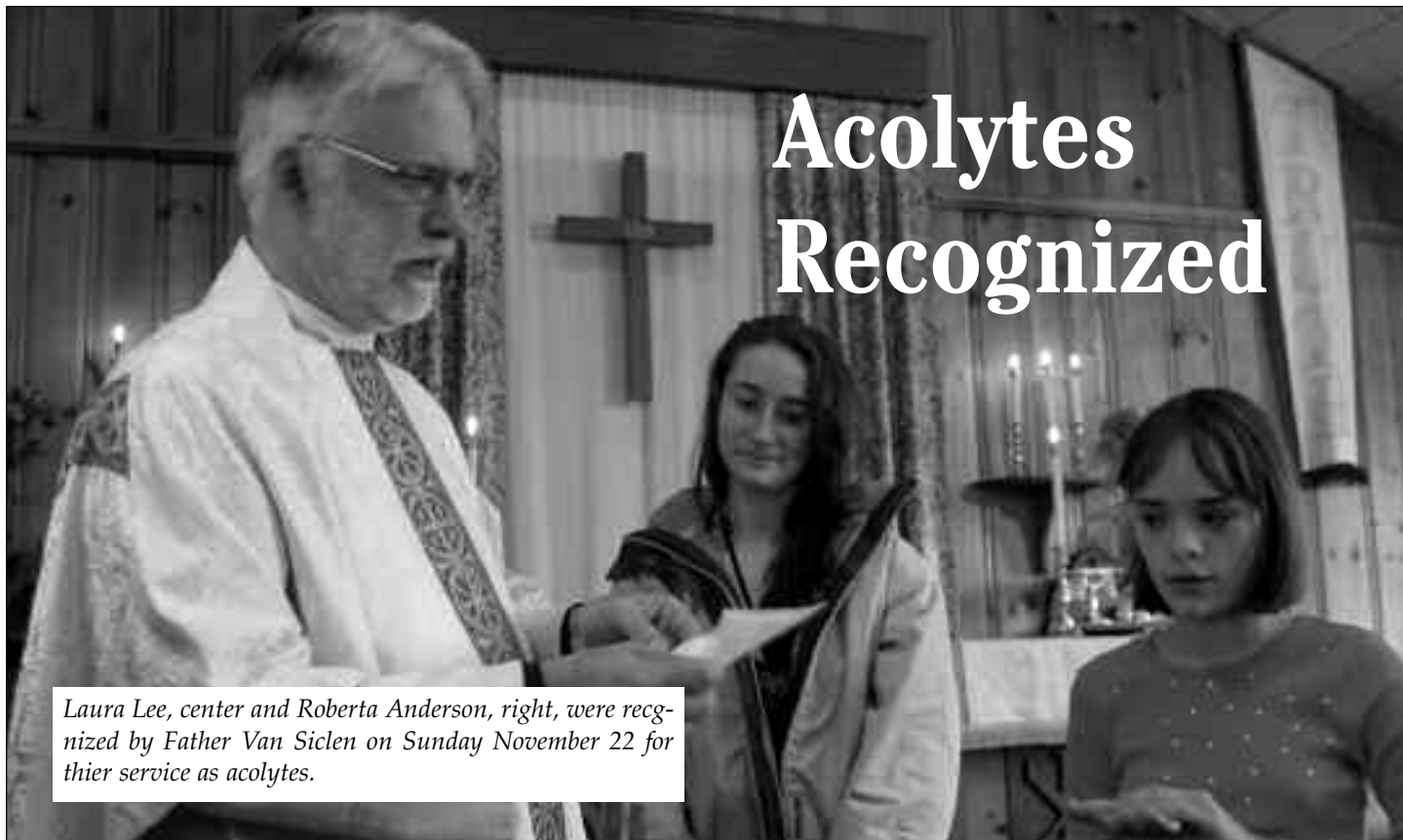
